

I don't exactly remember who Rev. Neal Newlin was, but I will always be grateful to him. Just before Mary and I headed off to Andover Newton Theological School in 1977 I got a call from a member of the church in which I grew up, Little River UCC. She had a relative, an uncle I believe, who was a UCC pastor and was retiring. Rev. Newlin had accumulated, as all clergy do, a lot of books, some scholarly and some devotional, some dated by their language or perspective, some timeless. Included was a complete set of the Interpreter's Bible, the go-to resource for biblical commentary in the day. I sat for an hour or so looking over his treasure trove and boxed up more than I had a right to. They traveled with me to graduate school and in my subsequent moves. They became the core of my initial pastoral library.

I am now in Rev. Newlin's position and wondering what to do with all the books I have accumulated. I've been trying to think of an efficient way to distribute or dispose of them. Once I get a chance to sort through them and decide which ones I will take home I would be delighted if you or colleagues would like to add to your personal collection.

But what I've really been thinking about is not the books, but the giver. I'm not sure Rev. Newlin realized the impact his generosity had on my early years in ministry. In the pre-internet days it was a wonderful luxury to have such wisdom right at hand. I feel I have been blessed by and continued his ministry.

I've been thinking about legacies these days, in part because of my retirement, but more because of the deaths of Dick Holter and Lewis Corl. In the last few weeks we buried about 180 years of faithful service to the church. When I shared news of Lewis' death with Dick's son, Rick, he said "And Lewis Corl right after Dick Holter? That's a high percentage of the church's deacons in the 70's!" Dick and Lewis' service was not limited to any decade in which they were deacons. They remained faithful partners with the congregation in our music, education, service and worship life from their earliest years to their final days. I have been blessed by and hope I can continue their ministries.

Their burials with just a few family members present because of the Covid-19 social restrictions hardly did justice to the legacy they leave. There was so much more to remember and to say. There will be a time down the road when a larger group of family and friends can gather to lift up grateful hearts for the lives of these two men, but even before that day we can use what they and so many others have given us. They would expect nothing less from us than what they expected of themselves.

Nearly all the books I got from Rev. Newlin have his name inscribed on the title page. Perhaps he was in the habit of lending out the books and hoped to help the borrowers remember where they came from. Maybe it was to differentiate between those he had purchased and those given to him by his spiritual mentors and benefactors. Whose name is inscribed on your title page? There are many for me. My parents, of course, but also Beck, Skip, Scott and Allen. If I were to include CRUCC I would have to include Lee, Libby, Paul, Harold, Frances, Bill, Walter, Elizabeth, Dick, Lewis and a whole lot of other

And, of course, the title page of my book like yours would bear the name of Jesus. Our book always begins with God, the source and the destination of life. It is both humbling and empowering, but each of us is called to be Jesus' legacy. May God bless and guide us as we respond to that call wherever it takes us.

They currently do NOT need canned soup or peanut butter.

#### **Discipleship Board News**

The Discipleship Board, like most of our Boards, has been somewhat stifled with the confinement laid upon us with the current Pandemic, but we can report on a couple of our accomplishments during the month of April. The Soup Kitchen was able to serve a hot meal prepared by Anita & Ed Link, to 130 people! Due to the many lay offs, this was a larger than average number of folks. There were plenty of side dishes and desserts as well, contributed by church members, for which we are grateful. Before the Pandemic, the Board had been planning a joint Easter Fundraising Project with the Sunday School Classes, to benefit HEIFER INTERNATIONAL. Instead, we decided to donate \$200 and take advantage of a Match Donation Program, doubling our contribution to \$400! We hope to carry out our original fundraising project when church services and Sunday School Classes resume and make an additional donation to this worthy program. We plan to meet on our regular Board Night, May 11th, via ZOOM, to discuss ongoing events such as the annual Habitat trip and the Service Project and how we can adapt to the current social distancing restrictions. We would appreciate your good thoughts and prayers as we attempt to carry out the mission of our Board, and we hope all our church members and friends keep sight of our blessings even in these trying times.
