Inside Kyle's Head

The season of Christmas is past...well, nearly. January 6th is the twelfth day, when Christmas is done. Now comes the season of resolutions. This season is a much shorter one. The NPR show "Hidden Brain" recently said 25% of us break our new year's resolutions by the third week of January! Keeping our resolutions is so much harder than making them! There are a couple reasons why this happens.

One is that maybe we aren't inspired by our resolutions. We want to do something to improve ourselves, but our resolutions tend to be along the lines of losing weight or quitting a habit: correcting something we see as wrong or incomplete. Resolutions that are positive—wanting to learn a new skill, training for something you've always wanted to do tend to be more successful because we are inspired to work at them.

Another, more key reason resolutions fail is that we see them as something we alone have to do. Using the example of weight loss, I think I am the only one responsible for what I eat, and when that desire for gratification overwhelms my willpower, I give up. Author and pastor Rick Warren says relying on willpower is never enough; what we need is Godpower.

We might think of God-power as simply spiritual: praying, meditating, things like that. Prayer certainly is a foundation for our resolve, because prayer keeps us connected with God. But faith is not a one-to-one relationship between me and God. It is communal, it is that fullness of life in God is found in our relationships with others.

Part of keeping our resolutions, then, is recognizing what others around us do that supports or undermines our effort to keep our resolutions. Does that person say "Eat some cookies; they won't hurt you" or "Hey, since you're not eating cookies, I'm going to not eat any when you're around"?

Life, and faith, is a shared experience and it is amazing the profound effect we can have on each other's lives. We need other people, to rely on them for strength, to be the one they can rely on when they need help. That is how God weaves us together as a community. That sort of openness, of vulnerable hospitality, makes real here-and-now the realm of Christ's love we all yearn to experience.



Per recommendations from the Annual Budget Meeting, adjustments were made to this table and financial reports were modified to provide a more clear picture of the finances. The CRUCC Non-Budgeted Expenses (which include sound system upgrades for both the Chapel and the Sanctuary, a new HVAC system and a portion of the new van purchase) will use funds from the Capital Improvement Fund and the Memorial Savings Account. The CCCC Non-Budgeted Expenses were due to funds that were inadvertently omitted from the 2022 CCCC budget, but will be included going forward.
