We invite people of every race, gender, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, age, marital status, economic circumstance, and physical and mental ability into the worship, rites & sacraments, fellowship, and leadership of our church.

Inside Kyle's Head

Last month the Consistory finally had the chance to meet for their annual retreat day. It felt like it took too long to get everyone together, thanks to some busy schedules, but in some ways that day was the perfect time.

We worked through a number of questions Christ Reformed Church faces, not the least of which is "who are we and what do we do now that the pandemic has cleared?" For any organization that is a difficult question to suss-out the answer(s) to; it can be doubly difficult for a church or other religious group because our motivation is to not figure out what we want to do but where God is leading us to go.

The Consistory laid some of the foundation for that at last year's retreat, pondering the "why?" question: why does this church exist? why do we do the things we do? and to what end?

This year we drilled down deeper into our identity, what is our unique blessing as a church, for each other and for the community around us? We talked about what has been meaningful for us as members of the church, things of our past as well as our present. And we reviewed the results of the congregational survey the Church & Ministry committee conducted earlier this year.

What I heard coming out of this reflection and discernment process was the underlying, almost unconscious, recognition of what a blessing this church is to each of us and to Middletown, Frederick County, and who knows where else. Yes, we have our difficulties...that were exacerbated by the pandemic. Yes, we face some difficulties ahead as we—like all churches—continue to pivot to the new reality that active Christians are a minority in our country (fewer than 46% of Americans are active in any faith community as of 2019). But we have a uniqueness to offer the world around us that is compelling, that can speak to people where they are in their lives.

We identified three strengths that we want to build on in the rest of this year and into 2024 and for as long as God will have us move in these directions. They are:

- 1. To cultivate faith engagement with young families We want to focus on building connections with the parents and children that are already here, and create ties with families at the Children's Center in ways that are meaningful to them, demonstrate that we are interested in or concerned with that which is important in their lives.
- 2. To continue the work we began when we became Open & Affirming
 The O&A process was not an end, but a first step in becoming allies to people
 who are LGBTQ+. There are huge opportunities for us to reach out to people,
 to invite, welcome, and embrace them...but we don't really know yet how to
 effectively do that. Our first step will be to explore what it actually means and
 might look like for us to be active allies.
- 3. To be the kind of church that helps people explore the breadth and depth of their spiritual lives

The United Church of Christ is often portrayed as being wishy-washy Christians, because we're a little more flexible on what is and isn't correct Christian belief and practice. I saw the UCC as this way for a long time; Presbyterians are big on being doctrinal, adhering to "fixed points" of faith.

Inside Kyle's Head (cont.)

The struggle with being a denomination where "they all may be one" (Jesus' words in John 17) is that we have to allow that there will be some unconventional views of Christian faith, of Jesus, of God, of the Bible, of the Church. We want to be a church where people, wherever they are on life's journey, may feel safe to explore what it means to be created and loved by God in Jesus. We already do some of that in bible studies, and in God on Tap; we want to continue to develop such opportunities.

These three foci are the lenses through which I and Consistory want to examine all we do, in every ministry, in every event, in everything. Every board and committee now has a way by which they can determine the priorities of the things they do—something as "mundane" as Property Board can ask "what can we do to make our facility more accessible to those we invite here?", Parish Life can ask, "What kind of events can we offer that

would make those we invite feel not just welcome, but embraced?"

This is absolutely exciting to me, not just that we found three very powerful foci for our ministry but that this is just a beginning. I'm looking forward to continuing to work with Consistory on this through the coming months.

I invite you to contemplate how you might get in on this, on what God is doing with us and with you! In the coming months you will see things happening, new faith development experiences, and I hope you not only take advantage of them but invite others to do so as well.
