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Inside Kyle's Head

Over the past 30, 40, 50 years our culture has developed this idea that politics is either a bad thing that will never get better, or an intensely personal thing. As a result, we've become a society that is passionately divided yet also largely indifferent to being involved in our governance.

Politics is not a bad thing, nor should we avoid talking about it, even in the church. Politics comes from the Greek word *politikos*, which is concern with the civic or public welfare, well-being. The welfare of our community—be it Middletown or Frederick County or Maryland or the United States—<u>should</u> be our concern as citizens of the Realm of God. Through the prophets (particularly Jeremiah) God repeatedly instructed God's people to look out for their community's welfare, literally the community's *shalom*.

Nearly 240 times *shalom* is used in the Old Testament. It means a LOT more than simply "peace" in Hebrew. It carries with it an understanding of wholeness, fulfillment of purpose, harmony of life. Being political, then, is to seek the *shalom* of our community by working towards it being a place where people are lifted up, find wholeness of being, of life, and create peace together in harmony with any and all who are here or come here.

Perhaps we need to reclaim the *shalom* understanding of politics. Politics should never be a means to get our way, to control others, to impose our world view on them. Instead, our politics should be that of doing that which lifts up the people of our community, imparts dignity to all people, builds equity in places of inequality that demonstrates love as *shalom*, as deep and abiding and life-bringing making of peace for all people.

Let's recognize that politics is a part of who we are. We as a church became political when we committed to providing backpacks of food for children in local schools who otherwise might not have enough to eat on weekends. We became



political when we committed to hosting the Community Table (what was the soup kitchen) the first Sunday of every other month. We became political when we decided in 2019 to be an Open & Affirming church.

A church that continually asks and seeks to answer the question, "How are we manifesting God's *shalom* in the world around us?" is a church that is both a blessing, and deeply blessed!

Increasingly incapacitated by illness, Christina seemed destined for a small life. 
Called to Care
