Pastoral Thoughts

"Anticipation" by Carly Simon (can't believe that I'm quoting a song from 50 years ago) begins with these words "We can never know about the days to come, but we think about them anyway." As the verses progress the singer retreats from the riskiness of looking too far into the future preferring to find comfort in her present; after all, she ends, "These are the good old days." Unfortunately the good old days, the now that we cherish so dearly, quickly becomes the past and we must move forward into a new now.

As December dawns we are indeed moving into the new now of the church year; ADVENT, a four week season of looking forward to new beginnings and of anticipating the birth of Jesus, the coming of Christ into our world. We have spent the last twenty-six weeks since Pentecost reminding ourselves of Jesus' teachings and attempting to apply them in our lives. Just as our spinning, orbital planet marks time with the passage of days and years so too does our liturgical year, cycling through Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost then back to Advent. This short season is a time to relax and enjoy, to appreciate and anticipate the miracle of Christmas.

It may seem strange that the secular world (of which we are all a part) precedes the Church in it's anticipation of Christmas with holiday carols and decorated trees wherever you go. Clearly Christmas is no longer contained or sandwiched between Dec 25th and Jan 6th the church's traditional "Twelve Days of Christmas." But what might Jesus think of these changes? Where on the spectrum of possible responses would Your Jesus lie? Does your Jesus expect us to conform to the practices of the past or to evolve into bearers of a new future?

The phrase "Your Jesus" might be new to you, but the term attempts to recognize that each of us has a unique, special relationship of heart, mind and soul with Christ. Sure there are common understandings and shared beliefs. Jesus is both Our Jesus and Your Jesus and Advent is that time when we can all look forward, with expectation and hope for what his rebirth might mean for us and for this conflicted world.






