Pastor's Pen

Dear Flock,

As we begin our season of Lent in a few weeks, I wanted to offer some personal reflection to assist you in your Lenten journey this year.

I grew up in Hagerstown. When I moved to College Park to finish my undergraduate degree and begin graduate school, I missed Hagerstown ("home") a lot. I remember returning on occasion to see my mother or traveling up this way to perform with a musical group. I would usually arrive here after dark. There was a sense of anticipation while ascending South Mountain. No, the feeling had nothing to do with traffic. It was that feeling of reaching the top of the mountain and beginning the trip down the other side.

It was a special time because once we crested the mountain, the lights of the valley shone brightly in the darkness. That view meant I had arrived "home." What a settled feeling that conjured up for me. There are times when I still have that sensation. The mountain is crested, the valley appears, and there is the feeling of a whole-body sigh. I am home. Home meant being loved, accepted, welcomed, and nurtured.

Lent is traditionally a time in the church year when we are called to recognize our own powerlessness – our inability to make ourselves better or save ourselves. Personally, I think Lent should be the opposite. I feel like to be truly "into" Lent, it's a time of reflection, renewal, and refreshment. Yes, it's time to take an inventory of ourselves. Yes, that will involve some thought on your part. Yes, it might be tough. Tough, and yet, a necessary time of getting in touch.

We often think of Lent as being a time when we "give up" something to remind us of Christ's sacrifice in the desert. I remember a friend proudly remarking that she had given up brussel sprouts. She hated them in the first place, so it really wasn't a sacrifice. I would like to offer up a different approach as we journey through Lent this year. Why not "come home" for Lent.

Why not begin your Lenten journey by joining us for our Ash Wednesday service. If you're not sure, give us a try. I offer up our Mission Statement:

No matter where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here. Because Jesus has taught us to love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul, strength, and mind, and to love our neighbors as ourselves, we declare Christ Reformed UCC to be an Open and Affirming church. We invite people of every race, gender, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, age, marital status, economic circumstance, and physical and mental ability into the worship, rites & sacraments, fellowship, and leadership of our church.

Consistory Corner

Members of the Consistory and Search Committees met with Reverend Vertie Powers on Saturday, January 13. Reverend Powers is working as a consultant for the Congregation during this time of transition. She will also be preaching one Sunday a month. The first session was a time to get acquainted with each other and an opportunity for Reverend Powers to learn more about the Congregation. The next meeting, which is open to everyone in the Congregation, is scheduled for February 24th, (time to be determined). Reverend Powers wants to hear more about the Vision/Mission of the Congregation and the plans to achieve that vision and fulfill that mission. We should also be prepared to discuss the criteria Christ Reformed is looking for in a new pastor and discuss how we are talking about the traumas of the last four years and how we are adjusting. Reverend Powers has two questions she would like us to reflect on: "Where and how has God guided us in our history?" and "Why does the world need the Church?" Please plan to attend this meeting on February 24th.

Ash Wednesday

The season of Lent, the 40 weekdays between Ash Wednesday and Easter, is a time given to spiritual reflection and exploration. In the early centuries of the church the observance was only a few days longs, but after the Council of Nicaea in 325 it was extended to forty days. That number mirrored the fasts of Moses, Elijah and Jesus. Observance was very strict. Only one meal a day was eaten. Meat, fish and eggs were forbidden. In modern times the emphasis on fasting has been reduced, but Lent is still a season given to greater prayer, contemplation and service. We'll observe the beginning of with а worship service Wednesday, **February 14th at 7pm** in the sanctuary. This year, we will also offer "Drive-thru" imposition of ashes from 7am to 9am and 12pm-1pm in the church parking lot.


How Can YOU Help These Children?






