Pastor's Pen

Dear Flock,

It's interesting to try and write a note about Easter when we are only on the Second Sunday in Lent. My question to you is "What is the message of Easter for you?"

Matthew 12:21 says... "In his name the nations will put their hope." Stop what you are doing and put yourself in the shoes of the women who went to the tomb in those darkened morning hours. Imagine the hopelessness when they arrived and saw the stone moved and found the tomb empty. For these women their day started in darkness and with many questions. Life is like that at times. We are in the dark, with many questions, thinking all is lost, and seemingly without hope.

Think back to January when we remembered our own baptism through the Baptism of Jesus. At this service we are reminded that Jesus calls each one of us by name. We listen to his voice. We remember that we belong to him forever. I'm sure Mary experienced that when she encountered Jesus that early morning.

The message of Easter is indeed hope. When life seems hopeless. When it seems like everything is working against us, hope is all we have. What is possible when there is hope?

I remember a story I heard many years ago in a sermon that put everything in perspective for me.

There was a teacher who was assigned to visit children in a large city hospital who received a routine call requesting that she visit a particular child. The teacher took the boy's name and room number and set out to provide an English lesson on nouns and adverbs. She was to help him with homework so he didn't fall behind in his studies.

It wasn't until the visiting teacher got to the hospital that she realized the boy's room was in the hospital's burn unit. No one had prepared her to find a young boy horribly burned and in great pain. Feeling that she could not just turn around and walk out, she stammered awkwardly introducing herself and outlining the lesson. The boy was barely responsive and yet she pressed on, stumbling through the English lesson, ashamed of putting him through such a senseless exercise.


The next morning the teacher received a call from a nurse in the burn unit asking, "What did you do to that boy?" Before the teacher could finish her outburst of apologies, the nurse interrupted her: "You don't understand. We've been very worried about him. But ever since you were here yesterday, his whole attitude has changed. He's fighting back; he's responding to treatment. It's as if he has decided to live!" Amazing? A miracle?

The boy later explained that he had completely given up hope until he saw the teacher. It all changed when he came to a simple realization. With joyful tears,

the boy explained: "They wouldn't send a teacher to work on nouns and adverbs with a boy who was dying, now would they?"

I don't remember where this story originated and, if copyrighted, I don't know that either. This wonderful story invites us to celebrate the gift of life...hope...when all we seem to see around us is pain, disappointment, and brokenness. It shows us that on the other side of pain and uncertainty, there is resurrection and new life and transformation ahead. It reminds us of what is possible whenever there is hope!

Consistory Corner

The 2024 Consistory met on February 12, for our first meeting as a new board. The first order of business was to elect officers. Consistory chose Laura Fontaine to continue as president, Laura Verdi was elected vice president, and JJ Bell-Godfrey was elected to serve as secretary. Consistory also assigned consistory members as liaison to each committee and boards of the church. Consistory finalized the details of the contract with Reverend Powers as consultant. She is scheduled to be at the church again the weekend of March 9 and 10. Consistory talked about several issues related to the Children's Center. There was concern about tenants of the new apartment building walking their dogs close to the Children's Center playground. This is a problem both of hygiene and safety. Consistory has asked Property Board to put up "No Dog Walking" signs in this area. If the situation continues Consistory will look into a fence. There was another instance of the tenant of Weagly House being unable to access their vehicle. A consistory representative will talk to the management of the apartments. Consistory voted to reserve a space at Frederick Pride on June 22. If you have any issues or concerns you would like to bring before Consistory, feel free to talk to any member of Consistory.

WEEKEND FOOD PROGRAM

Many children in the Middletown valley area are provided a free or reduced priced lunch on school days, but they face the prospect of hunger on the weekend. 
