

#### Pastor's Pen

Dear Flock,

As your Designated Pastor, I feel the need to lead you in some sort of discussion about the future of Christ Reformed UCC. I have spent a great deal of time researching, reading, and processing information that might make this possible for us. I was drawn in by a study (for the lack of a better word) by Barbara Lloyd through the United Church of Canada. I presented it to both the Church in Ministry Committee and Consistory. Both groups seemed excited and have given their blessing to proceed.

I have used the word discernment several times recently. Someone asked about it at the early service a few weeks back. Merriam-Webster says it means the quality of being able to grasp and comprehend what is obscure: skill in discerning, an act of perceiving or discerning something. I don't think our task is obscure. I think we know the direction and what we hope would come from studying our situation and where we see ourselves in the future.

Let's look at discernment from a biblical standpoint. I like this definition I discovered online. In the Bible, discernment is the ability to think biblically about all aspects of life, and to make careful distinctions about truth. It is also the ability to distinguish between good and better, and even better and best. Discernment is considered a special grace gift by some, and is essential for all people, and must be constantly nourished. The New Testament says that discernment is required for the believer, and intersects the Christian life at every point.

The study I found is called Open to the Spirit. There are five areas that we will examine, process, and discuss that hopefully will give us some insight into the future. The theme for the first chapter is Radical Welcoming. What does "Radical Welcoming" mean to you in the context of the ministry of Christ Reformed UCC? Plan to attend the worship service on Sunday, June 30, at 10 a.m., and we will begin our discernment process together. It is a time of thinking, processing, and dreaming about what our church can be for the future.

The Bible says that the Word of God discerns the thoughts and intentions of one's heart. A discerning mind demonstrates wisdom and insight beyond what is seen and heard. Life is full of difficult decisions for which there are often no easy or obvious choices. We all need discernment. Paul and Timothy write that love, knowledge, and discernment go hand in hand.

In Philippians 1:9-10 (NIV), Paul prays, "And this is my prayer: that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight so that you may be able to discern what is best and may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ."

Before June 30, you can do several important tasks. One is to pray for our church, this process, and our future. Two is to think of what Radical Welcoming means to you and the times and places you have been radically welcomed.

May the Spirit continue to love, sustain, and radically welcome us in this community of faith. See you June 30!

#### Field of Hope Growing Project

The Field of Hope Growing Project is a joint effort of ten local churches and is affiliated with Growing Hope Globally (formerly Foods Resource Bank). international organization whose mission is to alleviate world hunger by globally connecting local communities through agriculture. Each year, in support of the Field of Hope Growing Project, members of the Churches donate their land, time, labor and money to help eradicate hunger through sustainable programs that grow lasting solutions to hunger. 2024 marks our seventeenth year of working toward helping our brothers and sisters rise out of hunger and poverty. We begin each Growing Project in the spring with the Blessing of the Seed service on Sunday, June 2nd and finish in September or October with the Harvest Celebration. #### Congregational Meeting Weagly House

During the May 19, 2024 Congregational Meeting the Weagly House Task Force Committee presented a summary of their work regarding the disposition of the House. The Task Force Committee recommended that CRUCC not sell Weagly House. Following a summary of the information in the Weaqly House Task Force Committee Final Report, the Congregation engaged in a dynamic discussion that allowed those in attendance to further delve into the Task Force Committee's recommendation. At the close of the discussion, a vote was called and the Congregation voted unanimously to not sell the Weagly House.

#### **Consistory Corner**

Consistory continues to work on revisions to the bylaws. Among the changes, is to add a new by-law to define the relationship between the Church and the Christ Church Children's Center. The Consistory is expected to vote on changes at one of the meetings this summer. Once approved by the Consistory, copies of the by-laws with changes clearly marked, will be made available to the Congregation and a Congregational vote will be scheduled for fall. If anyone has any questions or concerns that you would like to bring before the Consistory, feel free to talk to any Consistory member.









## JUNE CONSISTORY INFORMATIONAL MEETING







### WEEKEND FOOD PROGRAM

Many children in the Middletown valley area are provided a free or reduced priced lunch on school days, but they face the prospect of hunger on the weekend. In partnership with area churches, the weekend food program helps to fill this gap by providing weekend bags full of food for over 102 children in these eight schools: *Middletown Elementary, Primary, Middle and High School, Myersville, Valley and Wolfsville Elementary.*




